Our Faith

At HFHC, health is not only achieved through physical means. We focus on addressing the health of the body, mind, and spirit, as we believe each is an integral part of human well-being. We provide services to adults of all ages, backgrounds and cultures while glorifying God and spreading his word. HFHC programs and services empower patients to take control of their health so they can pursue jobs, become more active members of the community and ultimately fulfill His purpose.

Who We Serve

HFHC acts as a safety net for those with medical needs and have nowhere to turn. Eligible patients have an income level at or below 200% of the federal poverty level, are uninsured or have government mandated coverage with severe limitations. They include the homeless, the disabled, the elderly, and a growing number of the working poor. Many have fallen through the cracks of the health care system and have no place else to turn for help.



Local dentists, hygienists and assistants volunteer their time and expertise in our dental clinic or provide care at their own office as part of our referral network. Care begins with an oral exam and cleaning from a dental hygienist. This includes an oral cancer screening, visual and x-ray detection of decay, and patient education with nutrition counseling. Patients in need of follow up care are scheduled with one of our volunteer dentists for restorations, extractions, oral surgery, prosthodontics and periodontal exams.







Volunteer optometrists provide comprehensive eye exams and treatment. Free eyeglasses are provided by our community partners. We also offer dilated exams for diabetic patients, needed to detect signs of retinopathy. These exams may include digital retinal imaging, blood glucose screening and referrals for follow up care.

One in three adults **over the age of 65** suffers from hearing loss. Medicare for seniors does not cover hearing exams, hearing aids nor exams for fitting hearing aids. HFHC provides free gently-used refurbished hearing aides or brand new hearing aids through the Starkey Foundation at 5% of the retail price (usually \$1,500—\$2,000). Audiology providers in our referral network provide free hearing exams and audiology reports to patients.

Certified diabetic educators and a group of trained volunteers provide coaching in diabetes management and lifestyle changes to empower and improve the quality of life for those living with diabetes. This program provides nutritional counseling, exercise advice and tips and tools for disease management. Free test strips, monitors, lancets and A1C testing are given. Referrals for vision and foot care allow patients to better monitor the various conditions associated with diabetes.

"Managing my diabetes and blood pressure on my own was extremely stressful. I could not always afford to buy the medicine and supplies I needed. During each visit, patients are given a comprehensive exam to look for common concerns that accompany diabetes. Weight and blood pressure are taken, analyzed and compared to previous results. This allows for a segue into the discussion of the importance of nutritional choices and a healthy lifestyle. We assist in setting "S.M.A.R.T. goals" and put together an Individualized Action Plan to carry out personal health goals. HFHC also hosts annual Diabetic Alert Day to raise awareness for the disease and provide management support.



Podiatrist provides clients with preventive care, diagnosis and treatment of a range of problems affecting the feet, ankles and lower legs. Monthly clinics provide nail debridement, treatment of lesions, nail excision, and radiological exams. More severe cases are referred. Podiatrists are often the first to identify systemic diseases in patients, and serve an important role in diabetes and vascular disease management.



The monthly clinic addresses the physical need of foot care as well as the spiritual need for prayer. Sessions include a warm foot bath, nail and callus care and foot massage. Intentional conversations provide a natural setting for sharing spiritual needs and offering group and individual prayer to our patients. The lasting relationships formed provide both physical and spiritual healing.



Program Coordinator Alice Camarota, RN HFHC works with local medical providers to assist clients in accessing the Patient Assistance Programs of pharmaceutical companies. Patients are then able to obtain the prescription medications they need and would otherwise go without. Medications most commonly ordered for patients are used to treat diabetes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol and COPD.



2016 in Review



Dentures

Last year, Dr. Martin Raebel, DDS, spearheaded the expansion into dental prosthetics, allowing HFHC to restore smiles after oral surgery. The denture program has allowed HFHC to provide more comprehensive dental care. In January 2017, the denture lab was equipped with plumbing to create a fully functioning space for denture fitting and molding. Since last year, we have provided 64 unique dentures and partials valued at \$81,145.



Podiatry

Due to the overwhelming need for specialized podiatric care in Pamper and Prayer sessions, HFHC began providing monthly podiatry clinics with the help of Dr. Guisinger, DPM. Facilities have expanded to hold a fully equipped treatment room including two new exam chairs and permanent storage for podiatric supplies.



Needs Assessment

The Needs Assessment has remained the point-of-entry to all clinic services, providing the opportunity to discuss pressing physical, emotional, financial, occupational, and spiritual needs with a trained Client Advocate. Program volunteers refer patients to over 200 agencies in five local counties to ensure we are able to meet a wide variety of patient need. Because of the positive response from clients, HFHC will continue this new program to effectively provide whole-person care.

In 2016, volunteers donated a total of 6,951 hours, valued at \$276,729



Who We Serve

Empowering patients to take charge of their health.

Programs and services are strategically planned to correlate with the identified healthcare gaps specific to the greater Ottawa and Allegan counties.


Our care goes beyond treatment and places great emphasis on prevention and education. HFHC programs are designed to help each patient understand the importance of a healthy lifestyle and empower them to take control of their health.

Two of the priority areas identified by the local County Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) are access to mental health services and dental care. County statistics show 43% of those living with a household income less than \$20,000 per year have not visited a dentist in the past year. The need is reflected at HFHC as 87% of new patients request dental care, and 18% request counseling services.

The CHNA reports nearly 1 in 3 under-served residents rate their health as fair to poor. HFHC statistics show that the need for health care is consistently described as the most pressing need of our clients (severity of 9 on a scale of 1-10). Other pressing needs include financial (8), life satisfaction (7.5), food (7), and housing (7).

The CHNA shows that roughly 20,000 county residents live in poverty and 17% are uninsured. At HFHC, over 71% of our patients live below the Federal Poverty Level, and over 33% have no insurance.

At HFHC we serve the underserved. Last year, we provided care to 21 veterans, and 22% of our patients were disabled.



Daren's Story

Daren and his family left his homeland and lived as refugees 3 years. He was captured by a rebel group, held prisoner and tortured for over a year. He has multiple medical conditions which worsened and went untreated. Recently under the sponsorship of a local church his family was brought to the area. He and his wife were connected introduced to HFHC for dental services.

Daren shared: "The Church members served as our transporters and translators during each of our appointments at the health clinic. Although we had never been to a dentist before, and I was nervous about the pain in my mouth, the dentist was so kind and had a personal interest in me. We are so grateful to our church family and to HFHC for assisting in our transition to U.S. life and providing us with much-needed dental care."

The family is living in one of church parish houses and advocates are working to connect them to other resources. Daren speaks several languages and is an engineer who is eager to find work in the U.S. so he can provide for his family. They are grateful to their new church family and to HFHC for assisting their transition to U.S. life and providing them with much needed care.
